The Chesapeake Bay Summit 2022 focuses on watershed health

Summit, part of MPT's 18th annual Chesapeake Bay Week, airs April 21 at 9 p.m.

What:

MPT's annual Chesapeake Bay Summit production tackles the tough questions surrounding the fight for a cleaner Chesapeake Bay. During this year's one-hour forum, panelists evaluate the current state of the Chesapeake Bay watershed and discuss what changes need to be made to achieve a cleaner and healthier estuary.

From the National Baseball Hall of Fame in Cooperstown, New York to the world's largest naval station in Norfolk, Virginia and Shenandoah National Park in Virginia's Blue Ridge Mountains, a raindrop that falls in each of these storied locales will eventually make its way to the Chesapeake Bay.
