MPT series *Maryland Farm & Harvest* visits locations in Baltimore, Harford, and Washington counties during February 17 episode

OWINGS MILLS, MD – [Maryland Public Television's](#) popular original series [Maryland Farm & Harvest](#), now in its 13th season, will feature farms and locations in Baltimore, Harford, and Washington counties during a corn-themed episode premiering on Tuesday, February 17. Maryland Farm & Harvest airs on Tuesdays at 7 p.m. on MPT and online at mpt.org/livestream. Episodes are also available to view live and on demand using the free [PBS app](#) and MPT's [online video player](#).

The popular weekly series takes viewers on a journey across the Free State, telling engaging and enlightening stories about the farms, people, and technology required to sustain and grow agriculture in Maryland, the state's number one commercial industry.



Joanne Clendining, who has earned three Emmy® awards from the National Capital Chesapeake Bay Chapter of the National Academy of Television Arts & Sciences for her work on *Maryland Farm & Harvest*, serves as series host. She is joined by Al Spoler, host of "The Local Buy" segments, and by a variety of local chefs who serve as guest hosts of the series' "Farm to Skillet" segments.

With introductions filmed at [Maple Dell Farm](#) in **Woodbine (Howard County)**, the February 17 episode features the following stories:

- **Zahradka Family Farm (Baltimore County):** George Zahradka is the third generation to farm a property that has been in his family for more than 100 years. Today, he describes [Zahradka Family Farm](#) – which he runs with his wife and daughter – as **Essex's** last working family farm. The farm

features a wide array of animals and produce, but George's obsession with sweet corn makes it the superstar. At their "little oasis right outside of Baltimore," the Zahradkas plant small patches of corn every few days to maintain supply for their growing group of devoted customers.

- **Tar Spot Research (Harford and Washington counties):** The Rose Family has been stewarding the land at [Clear Meadow Farm](#) in **White Hall** since the 1940s. They've dealt with countless challenges over the years, and now they're facing a new threat to their corn crop: tar spot. Tar spot (*Phyllachora maydis*) is native to South America, but it was found in the United States in 2015 and began appearing in Maryland – including at Clear Meadow Farm – in 2022. Today, tar spot is the most significant disease limiting corn growth in the U.S. Fortunately, Senior Agent [Andrew Kness](#) and other researchers at the University of Maryland Extension's [Western Maryland Research & Education Center](#) in **Keedysville** are racing to prevent the spread and to identify effective treatment strategies for farmers throughout the state and beyond.
- **The Local Buy: Broom's Bloom Dairy (Harford County):** Segment host Al Spoler visits [Broom's Bloom Dairy](#) in **Bel Air**, where ice cream is truly "cow-to-cone." When sisters Emmy and Belle Dallam returned to the ninth-generation family dairy farm after graduating from college, they helped grow the operation into a profitable business that could support their parents and themselves. Al gets a full tour of the family's new processing facility before helping make one of the ice cream shop's most sought-after creations, sweet corn ice cream, made with their own ice cream mix and local corn grown at [Hopkins Produce](#) in **Havre de Grace**. More than 19 million viewers have watched *Maryland Farm & Harvest* on the statewide public TV network since its debut in 2013. The series has traveled to more than 500 farms, fisheries, and other agriculture-related locations during its first 12 seasons, covering every Maryland county, as well as Baltimore City and Washington, D.C.
